Tatiana Bonch-Osmolovskaya is a writer, philologist, artist. Participant in Symmetry festivals (2003, 2009) and Bridges festivals (2010, 2011). Curator of festivals of Russian literature in Australia.

Marion Cohen's poetry book, "Crossing the Equal Sign," describes the experience of mathematics. She teaches at Arcadia University and has developed a course, Mathematics in Literature.

Sandra DeLozier Coleman is a retired mathematics professor whose interest in art with mathematical elements includes poetry as well as several forms of visual art.

Carol Dorf's poems appear in *Sin Fronteras*, *Spillway*, *In Posse Review*, *Poemeleon*, *Feminist Studies*, *Fringe*, *Runes* and anthologies. Poetry editor of *Talking Writing*, she teaches math at Berkeley High School.

JoAnne Growney's first career was teaching mathematics at Bloomsburg University. Now she writes poetry and a blog (<http://poetrywithmathematic.blogspot.com>) in Silver Spring, Md.

Charlotte Henderson graduated college with a double major in mathematics and English and is now a mathematics book editor at A K Peters/CRC Press.

John Arden Hiigli is an American artist, inventor and educator who has exhibited in Hungary, Slovakia, Moscow and the US. He is the founder of Le Jardin a l'Ouest and Jardin Galerie.

Rosanna Iembo is a mathematician, philosopher, theologian, poet. She is a member of the International Institute of Informatics and Systems, the MAA, and SIGMAA.

Irene Iaccarino began to play the violin at age 5, graduated with honors at age 19, participates in symphony-string orchestras, and in duo and soloist concerts.

Judith E. Johnson, Professor Emerita of English and Women's Studies at SUNY Albany, has published eight poetry collections, including *Cities of Mathematics and Desire* (Di Castagnola Prize, 1992.)

Gizem Karaali is a professor at Pomona College, a Project NExT fellow, an NSA Young Investigator Award recipient, and a founding editor of the *Journal of Humanistic Mathematics*.

Elizabeth Langosy is the executive editor of *Talking Writing*. Her essays, profiles, and special interest pieces appear in numerous publications; she is currently writing a book of linked short stories.

Jacqueline Lapidus's poems appear in many periodicals, anthologies and three collections: *Ready to Survive*, *Starting Over* and *Ultimate Conspiracy*. She is co-editing *The Widows' Handbook* (to appear).
